Paper Folding's on Greek stamps

Poorly printed stamps are having a defective appearance and aesthetic variations compared to the regular stamps. These differences are mainly due to accidental causes or carelessness during printing.

When printed stamps are checked by representatives of the issuing Postal Service, the poorly printed ones are destroyed. Sometimes, however, stamp sheets are circulated by Post Offices which contain defects that are not obviously noticeable.

A fascinating adventure for philatelists is the search for poorly printed - defective stamps. Many of these have been studied and published in journal articles.

One type of poorly printed stamps are those showing paper folding's.

Sometimes the paper, when placed on the press, is folded and then it is printed folded. When the fold is straightened after printing, the stamp shows a white portion, depending on the fold.





The exhibit shows Greek poorly printed stamps from the issue of the Large Hermes Heads to recent ones, which result from the folding of the printing paper and have the following peculiarities:

- 1. They are not repetitive as is the case with "plate" errors
- 2. They are not easily detectable during printing due to their gum
- 3. They are usually only apparent after the stamps have been "washed" as a result of the gum removal; and
- 4. They are accidental.
